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DEPUTY REPORT

MRS SHERRY

Year 11 are currently completing their Yearly Examinations which mark the conclusion of their Preliminary Studies. All students are wished the best and encouraged to return fresh next term ready to begin their HSC studies. The majority of our students have had a successful year in getting all assessment tasks submitted by their deadline and have been able to make a committed effort to performing above their previous level of commitment.

At the beginning of next term, the assessment schedule begins for the HSC course, which means that all students have a fresh start and those that missed a submission deadline will have another opportunity to ensure that all tasks are handed in on time.

On Wednesday, 2 November we will be holding a Year 12 HSC Information Night which is compulsory for all students and at least one parent to attend. On this evening, information is given on how the HSC Mark is calculated using the School Assessment mark and the HSC Examination mark. The information received on the evening provides a solid basis of understanding for students and parents for the following 12 months about the requirements of the HSC year and the final examination. It is just 12 short months until Year 11 students will be finalising their studies and preparing for graduation.

As a Deputy Principal, I am occasionally speaking to students who have spoken about another student in a mean or disrespectful way. At Picnic Point High School, we value all students and students are regularly reminded about respecting themselves, other students and our teaching staff. We strongly believe that all students and staff have the right to come to school and have the right to learn without interruption.

In order to ensure this, we consider the safety, care and wellbeing of all our students and staff in line with the Department of Education's Suspension and Expulsion of School Students Procedures Policy. Parents are encouraged to monitor the Millennium Student Portal and contact the school if there are concerns about your child's learning or behaviour at school.

I have been regularly walking through Year 7 and 9 classes and I have been enjoying seeing students engage in their learning. From Year 7 Art classes completing their clay work to Year 9 Science studying Sport Science during the Olympic period.

RELIEVING DEPUTY REPORT

As part of the school plan, Year 9 students will develop **Personalised Education Plans (PEP)** in week 9 of this term to help each individual focus on their strengths, weaknesses and develop some strategies that will lead to improved performance and achievement. Each student will be asked to consider their performance over the last 3 semesters and set some goals and put some strategies in place to help them achieve better educational outcomes by the end of the year.

Personalised Education Plan are based on the belief that students will be more motivated to learn, will achieve more in school, and will feel a stronger sense of ownership over their education if they decide what they want to learn, how they are going to learn it, and why they need learn it to achieve their personal goals.

In developing PEP, students are asked the following:

- Self-assess their individual learning strengths and weaknesses, or reflect on what they have academically achieved, excelled at, or struggled with in the past.
- Identify specific learning gaps or skill deficiencies that should be addressed in their education, or specific knowledge, skills, and character traits they would like to acquire.
- List or describe their personal interests, passions, pursuits, and hobbies, and identify ways to integrate those interests into their education.
- Identify 2 measurable, achievable academic goals for the next semester and put steps in place in working towards achieving these identified goals.

The general goal of a personalised education plan is to bring greater coherence, focus, and purpose to the decisions students make about their education. For this reason, it will include learning experiences that occur outside of the school, such as extra curricula activities and other outside of school commitments.

Parents are encouraged to assist their child in developing the PEP and be involved in substantive discussions with their children about their learning goals and educational interests.

Personalised Education Plans will be revisited and modified annually to reflect changes in student learning needs, interests, and aspirations. The completed PEP will be available for parents to access via Millennium.

DEPUTY'S REPORT – MS STAVROS LITERACY AT PPHS

At PPHS, teachers have been explicitly teaching the skills of visualising by asking students:

When reading a text do you create pictures in your head? What do you think visualising means? When do we visualise? Why is it important we visualise? How do we visualise?

Visualising involves **picturing in your mind** what is happening in the text. It helps us to **think** about what might happen next, to **remember** details about the text and it helps us to get really **involved** in the text too. It brings the reading to life and all of this helps us **understand** the text better! When reading a passage, try to create a **picture** in your mind of the scene. Then begin to add in the **characters**, the **smells**, the **tastes**, and what the character may be **touching**. It's like making the passage into a movie. We can use the skills of visualising before, during or after we read a text. Whether reading fiction or non-fiction, **visualising is central to reading** and to thinking with what we read.

Visualising

Description

Learners create a mental image from a text read/viewed/heard. Visualising brings the text to life, engages the imagination and uses all of the senses.

Example questions/statements

What are the pictures I/you have in my/your head as I/you read/view/ listen to this text?

Can I/you describe the picture or image you made while you read/ heard that part?

How did the pictures in my/your head help me/you to understand the text?

Example teaching idea

Sketch to stretch: As a passage/story is read students sketch their visualisation. In groups they share their sketches and discuss reasons for their interpretation.

Year 7 students have now received two rounds of Immunisations. Nurses from NSW Health will be visiting the school next term to administer the final vaccine to students. Below is an outline of Picnic Point High School's Immunisation Schedule for 2016.

Dates	Vaccination
Wednesday March 30 2016	HPV and dTpa
Thursday July 28 2016	HPV and Varicella
Wednesday November 30 2016	HPV

*Human Papillomavirus vaccine is recommended for all Year 7 students. Human papillomaviruses are common and affect both males and females. These viruses are responsible for a range of cancers and diseases.

*Diptheria, Tetanus and Pertussis [Whooping Cough] vaccine is now recommended for all Year 7 students. This dose replaces the 15 year old dose.

*Varicella [chickenpox] vaccine is recommended for students who have **not** had chickenpox or have not already been vaccinated.

You can check your child's vaccination history [up to 7 years of age] by calling the Australian Immunisation Register on 1800 653 809.

MATHS

Year 7

Students are currently learning about angles, length and finishing off this term with area. Being a more spatial topic, this helps some students visualise mathematical problems in a different context. Again, we encourage students to complete all homework exercises on time including the use of Mathletics. Year 8

MATHEMATICS ICAS TESTING



Students doing the ICAS Test





SCIENCE

What is an Ore? How do we measure distances in Space? Are proteins drinks affective for performance? How did evolution produce something as complex as the human eye? These are some of the questions that students from Years 7-10 have been addressing in Science this term.

Year 7 have been learning all about the Earth's resources, completing a series of investigation that simulate the process of mining and the efficiency of burning certain fuels.

Year 8 has been learning all about the recent, exciting discovery by scientists of Proxima B, a planet that is close enough to its Sun that it could support life, as we know it. The planet is relatively close to our solar system speaking in space terms as it is only a mere 4.24 light years away which means it is still in our galaxy. Year 8 are wondering whether with current spacecraft, will we reach

Year 9 have finished their final independent research task where they have researched a range of questions related to Sport Science.

Year 10 has been answering a series of questions about the origins of life from the Big Bang to the appearance of Humans in the topic called Time Traveller. As part of this topic, students looked at the complexity of the human eye and it's evolutionary origins. Students then had the opportunity of dissecting a bull's eye and identifying the different structures.

YEAR 10 SYDNEY JEWISH MUSEUM EXCURSION

On Wednesday the 17 August 2016, Year ten students had the opportunity to travel to the Sydney Jewish Museum located in Darlinghurst. For the duration of Term 3, Year 10 has been learning about the severity of the Holocaust on Jewish people and other groups.

The excursion began with an introduction to the Holocaust and what the museum offered for students. Year 10 was separated into two groups, in which one would have the amazing opportunity to listen to a Holocaust survivor, 92 year old Eddie. Eddie discussed how he escaped death through his engineering skills and knowledge. He had a major influence on us all. Despite all of his difficulties in life, he was extremely content and wished for us to be grateful for everything we have in life. His life story and attitude was an inspiration for us all. Every piece of advice he offered was willingly accepted by students.

After taking a small break, the groups swapped and we were seated in a lecture room in which we had a discussion about the German side of the Holocaust and the effect on German soldiers and citizens. We were then divided into smaller groups to examine the Anne Frank exhibition. Here, we were taken on a journey through the life of Anne Frank and the Annexe her and her family lived in. Following this exhibition, we were able to view primary evidence- original letters written by members of the Holocaust.

This excursion allowed Year 10 students to gain great knowledge and an understanding about the Holocaust. It had a personal impact on all the students. Overall it was an amazing experience.



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
STATE CROSS COUNTRY


LIBRARY NEWS


