They showed initiative and intelligence in answering probing questions from the families in attendance. Congratulations to those students that made themselves available and thank you for your commitment to our school.

Year 12 students have this week begun their Half-Yearly Examinations marking the half-way point of their HSC year. All students should always endeavour to work to the best of their ability and ensure all tasks are completed on time and to the highest standard in order to obtain the best possible rank in their course. Whilst striving to do their best, students and their parents are reminded to find the balance between school, work and family commitments and not place undue stress on themselves. There are many resources available online and in the community for students and their families that are finding the demands and pressure of the HSC course too much.

Bullying - No Way!

During Week 7 the school supported the National Day of Action against Bullying and Violence. Resources and information were sent home to parents and advertised through the school facebook page during the week about what bullying is and strategies to stop bullying. The main thought from the readings is that bullying is the ongoing harassment and teasing of a student and does not represent the one off situations where a student may say something mean to another student. Bullying can occur face to face or online as cyber bullying. All families are encouraged to access the resources sent home and also to look at the websites for more information if they would like some advice or support about strategies to assist their child on the one off occasions that their child is teased. Students are encouraged to let their teacher know when another student acts inappropriately towards them. We constantly remind students that if you don't have anything nice to say to someone else, then don't say anything. All repeated, serious and continued occurrences need to be reported to the school. This could be through the Year Advisor, Head Teacher of the subject or Deputy Principal of their year.

The end of term usually signals a range of assessments across all year groups. These are excellent opportunities for students to demonstrate just how much they have learned throughout the first part of their courses and reinforce the quality of their homework and study programs. The development of effective strategies to successfully address assessment periods is a key to academic achievement whether a student is in Year 7 or Year 12.

Year 11 interim reports are currently being finalised. These will provide the students and their parents a guide to how the student has transitioned into senior study. This is an early opportunity to reflect on what is working already and perhaps whether some new approaches are required to support a successful path to the HSC. Year 11 will commence their examination period immediately after the school holidays which will provide another indication of how students are progressing towards meeting course outcomes.

Year 11 camp was held at The Sydney Academy of Sport and Recreation in Narrabeen. Students completed aspects of the mandatory Crossroads program whilst undertaking challenges, initiative tasks and recreational activities. Once again, the students demonstrated their wonderful nature drawing praise from the Academy staff and teachers from other schools on the same site. An enormous amount of gratitude from the school is extended to the staff who committed themselves from their families for the students to have this opportunity, Mr Bleyerveen, Mr Montague, Ms Ngo, Mr Clay, Mr Giorgio – with an extended thank you to the Year Adviser, Ms Martin and her assistant, Mrs Harding, for their weeks of preparation and organisation to make it all work so well.

Year 7 and Year 8 are currently busy working on, studying and/or submitting their first assessment tasks for the year. It is important students seek the guidance and



support from their teachers when preparing for these tasks. Consulting their assessment booklet will also assist in being organised and well prepared for tasks. Every parent has access to the student assessment booklets by visiting *Curriculum & activities > Assessment & Reporting > Assessment booklet* on the PPHS Webpage www.picnicpt-h.schools.nsw.edu.au.

Parents and students are encouraged to become familiar with this booklet by carefully reading the school's procedures for assessment tasks and in particular would benefit from regularly checking the timing of



assessment tasks by consulting the calendar at the start of the booklet. Printing and placing a copy of this assessment calendar at the student's home study area is recommended.

Congratulations to **Year 8** for having the greatest number of students invited to the first Rewards Day Barbecue in Week 10 of this term. The challenge for Year 8 now is to remain at the top of the merit system throughout the year. Handing in their sticker passport and merits on a regular basis to their Assistant Year Adviser is essential.

Year 8 were a great audience during the Cyberbusters Performance. Year 8 had the opportunity to discuss and further reflect on the important messages of the performance in their BMW 'Belonging, Motivation, Wellbeing' lessons. They have delved into the similarities and differences between cyber bullying and face to face bullying and looked at strategies to stay safe on the internet.



What if my teaching is wrong?

In the pursuit of furthering staff understanding of what works well in education and as a means of generating a climate of discussion about learning, a number of teachers attended a two day professional learning workshop exploring the research of Professor John Hattie. Dr Hattie's research evaluates and measures the effectiveness of various approaches to teaching and learning. He provides a meta-analysis of meta-analyses, which in plain terms means he directly compares the most prominent global studies in education with each other to determine which work best. Dr Hattie's educational database and model for comparison is amongst the world's largest.

Dr Hattie's research highlights that teachers and schools often get distracted by things that truly do not make much difference. He also identifies that as adults, we forget about the processes involved in learning instead focusing upon shallow outcomes. By redirecting teaching to explicitly integrate formal meta-cognition (thinking about thinking) we can better educate students and more importantly help them to do this for themselves.

Dr Hattie's learning model reiterates that students must know the success criteria for their learning (where the goal posts are), that teachers should recognise what prior knowledge students have (their skills), that teachers should consider all student's dispositions to learning (their will) and that student's motivational attributes should be based in the desire to master rather than perform (the thrill). By structuring teaching around these principles, students consolidate more in depth, rather than surface knowledge and are able to transfer it more readily in real world situations.

Other core messages received emphasised that the making of errors remains vital to student's ongoing development and that paramount to this is a relationship of trust between the student and the teacher.

Finally, teachers must be more cognisant of determining the impact that they are having on teaching and learning. Both teachers and schools should measure growth and difference and consider how they can be doing things better.

The issue to be addressed by the school is how we are to translate this work into practise. Specifically where will we use the expertise and experience that already exists to enhance the conversations and practice that we implement around teaching and learning in this community? And how do we measure our successes, reflect upon them and assess whether there are better approaches that are more useful at the school planning level but more critically able to be adopted within classrooms?

Cyber Safety Tips for Parents from ReachOut

ReachOut is Australia's leading online mental health organisation for young people, providing resources, support and information about a variety of youth related issues, including bullying and cyberbullying https://au.reachout.com There is a section on the website for parents https://parents.au.reachout.com with information, stories, practical tips and forums covering a range of topics relevant to teenagers aged 12-18 years. The following cyber safety tips were created by Jono Nicholas, CEO of ReachOut - there are more tips on the ReachOut website.

Tip 1: The grandma rule.

The easiest way to learn good digital skills is to teach teenagers this rule: 'If you wouldn't be happy for grandma to see it, don't put it online.'

Tip 2: Get amongst technology yourself.

That way your teens will be more likely to come to you for help with a problem online if they know you are knowledgeable about it. You can even ask them to show you how. Research shows that young people are more likely to engage in healthy online behaviour if they see it being modelled by their parents.

Tip 3: Get to know the resources available to help you and your young person be safe online.

The e-Safety Commissioner website https://esafety.gov.au/ is a good place to start. You can also get familiar with how to block, delete and report offensive or bullying social media posts. The iParent page has specific resources about being safe online https://esafety.gov.au/education-resources/iparent

The following are the first steps to take if your child is the subject of hurtful comments or images posted online:

- don't respond to bullying behaviour
- keep evidence of bullying behaviour, via print outs or screen shots
- delete the offensive posts or messages once they've been documented
- untag or flag any photos for removal that are distressing
- unfriend or block the person that is posting hurtful comments
- set privacy settings and change any passwords that have been shared with others

The ReachOut website states that '...only around 1 in 10 young people inform a parent or trusted adult of cyberbullying...some reasons for this low number include embarrassment, fear of not being believed, fear of having the issue trivialised, or losing access to technology...' It's important to be proactive about the issue of cyberbullying. ReachOut advises that parents/caregives:

 ensure that your child only friends and chats with people on social media that they know in real life

- ensure that privacy settings are set on all your child's social media accounts
- make sure your child knows not to share or give out passwords
- ensure that your child knows how to block, delete or report anyone who is upsetting them online.

Young Women's leadership seminar at NSW parliament house

On Thursday 9th March, New South Wales Parliament House opened their doors to many young female leaders in celebration of International Women's Day. Year 11 and 12 girls from multiple Sydney schools joined the seminar to learn about the role that women play in leadership.

To start off the day an exhibit was displayed around the foyer showcasing the evolution of female impact in society. We were able to listen to a pre-recorded speech from a woman supporting women equality. Another significant piece in the exhibit was a mannequin wearing a costume advocating for women's rights. Then the seminar began. The discussion started by informing us of modern day statistics of women in leadership role. One statistic that was bewildering to hear was that out of the total 93 members of the Lower House of New South Wales Parliament only 27 are female representatives. In addition to this, out of the total 42 members of the Upper House of Parliament, only 10 are women.

After hearing about the minimal female representation in New South Wales parliament we were introduced to a woman in power that experienced the struggle of inequality and discrimination. Michelle Dixon is currently the first female CEO and partner at Maddocks, an Australian Law Firm. Michelle is a strong advocate for the progression of women into leadership; she is an ambassador for the workplace gender equity agency and fights for pay equity. She shared with us her struggle in fighting for her current position.

Following this eyeopening and inspirational discussion, we were then able to sit in and observe both the legislative assembly (Lower



House) and the legislative council (Upper House). Fortunately for us, Thursday was sitting day for Parliament. This meant that we could see the matters that the New South Wales Parliament was debating.

Once these matters concluded, we were lead back to the main theatrette. Here we met with some female members of Parliament, some of which included the member for Newtown, the member for Blue Mountains, and the representative for the Governor General. A casual Q and A was conducted between the women and the students. The women shared with us their beliefs, journeys and their goals. All of the representatives agreed that NSW needs a more diverse parliament in areas of gender and ethnicity. Overall, the

seminar introduced us to the reality that women still face discrimination and inequality. The day showed us how important it is for young women to support each other and take a stand for their own rights. We encourage everyone no matter what gender and race, to stand up for their beliefs and pursue their goals. We are very thankful to have been given this opportunity to visit NSW Parliament



and hear from such inspiring female leaders.

But when did *you* last have your women's health check? **Too busy!** It is important to look after your health in order to look after others! **Do you need it?** Women's health issues are very common and important to deal with, for example, breast cancer and cervical cancer can occur at any age and is the most common cancer in women in Australia. **If I have had my HPV vaccine- do I still need a pap smear?** Yes, although the HPV vaccine against celrvical cancer covers 70% of HPV types causing cervical cancers, there is still the risk of cervical cancer. **Worried about getting a health check?** Rest assured as at Bankstown Women's Health Centre we appreciate the sensitivity of certain health issues and have bulk-billing women doctors specialised in women health checks which are confidential.






PARENT ONLINE PAYMENTS (POP)



SCIENCE FACULTY REPORT

All students have continued to work enthusiastically this term. Half–Yearly Examinations are approaching for both junior and senior students. All students are encouraged to start preparation for these examinations. Regular revision of class notes, developing summary notes and catching up any missing work are all goals students should start to work towards.

Year 7 students have successfully completed the first science topic - Working like a Scientist and have progressed into the second exciting topic - Dangerous Creatures. This topic has involved students exploring the living things found on Earth. Students have been asked to consider scientific concepts including what characteristics makes something a living thing and comparing animals including those which are considered dangerous. The concept of classification or the grouping of organisms with similar traits has also been explored. Later in this topic students will study the structure of cells and be introduced to the use of microscopes in science. The first science research assessment task was issued to students in Week 7 for completion in Week 9. All students were supported by science teachers to help them navigate this new process, including a lesson from our school librarian on how to conduct effective science research and create a bibliography.

Year 8 students have continued to explore the **Edible**Science topic. All Year 8 students completed a firsthand investigation to examine the conduction qualities
of three different metals used in cooking pots. The
investigation was designed to enhance experimental
design skills and scientific literacy in students.

Year 11 Biology and Senior Science students visited the Georges River National Park in Week 7 to conduct field studies guided by the Georges River

Environmental Education Centre. Field work experience is essential to the effective study and understanding of both subjects senior and compliments the theory studied in the Preliminary Biology: Local Ecosystems topic and the



Preliminary Senior Science: Local Environment topic.

During this field work investigation students used

sampling techniques for factors such as air, soil and pH. Students also gained experience in conducting quadrat sampling and transects. The field opportunity also allowed students to focus on the adaptations of local flora (Banksia) and fauna (Tawny Frogmouth).



Year 11 Chemistry students have been extremely busy and have successfully completed the Chemical Earth topic and have progressed into the Metals topic. Students have submitted an assessment task on chemical bonding and compounds. Students

enthusiastically completed this task which included the creation of visual poster and construction of 3D models demonstrate the concept chemical bonding.



Year 12 Physics students have been working through the Motors and Generators topic this term. In Week 8, the students participated in a tutorial on motors provided by Mr Ian Holder. This tutorial provided students with the opportunity to examine motor models at different stages of assembly accompanied with expert discussion. The interactive structure of this tutorial provided students with an experiential learning experience to help enhance connections to theory studied in class. Mr Holder is a grandparent of Connor Keen in Year 11; it is with great gratitude from the Science Faculty that we thank Mr Holder for sharing his expertise, technical knowledge and time with our students.
