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# **Principal's Editorial**

### NCCD

The Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD) is an annual collection that counts the number of school students with disability and the level of reasonable educational adjustment they are provided with.

The NCCD will count students who have been identified as receiving an adjustment to address a disability under the Disability Discrimination Act 1992 (the DDA). The DDA can be accessed from the ComLaw website at www.comlaw.gov.au.

Our school participated in the 2014 trial and from 2015 the NCCD was mandatory for all schools in Australia. The aim of the national data collection is to collect better information about school students with disability in Australia. Every year your child's school will collect the following information for each student with a disability:

- the student's level of education (i.e. primary or secondary)
- the student's level of adjustment
- the student's broad type of disability.

The information collected by schools will be provided to all governments to inform policy and programme improvement for students with disability.

The definition of disability for the national data collection is based on the broad definition under the DDA.

For the purposes of the national data collection, students with learning difficulties such as dyslexia or auditory processing disorder as well as chronic health conditions like epilepsy, diabetes or asthma, that require active monitoring by the school, may be included.

Teachers and school staff will identify the number of students with disability in their school and the level of reasonable adjustment they are provided based on:

# **DP Report**

#### **Mrs Sherry**

Year 12 students have passed the half-way point of their HSC studies and as a year group we have reflected on achievements and areas for improvement during our year meeting. Each student has been asked to analyse their results in each of their subjects by rating their progress (below average, average or above average) and their approach to study (behind, on track, ahead with classwork). Students also wrote one goal for each subject in preparation for the Trial HSC Examination next term and they were also asked what support, guidance or further assistance the school and classroom teachers could provide them in each subject. Mrs Morris collated this information and has provided the most frequent requests to staff as a whole. Individual class responses will be provided to staff in the future. It is always important at this time of year for students to have the support of their families at home to assist them in ensuring they are dedicating the appropriate amount of time to each subject to keep up with current work, complete extra readings, revise their work and make summary notes and then practice past questions that are relevant to the work they are currently completing. This support at home and the constant focus on the end goal is essential for students to not lose focus on why they are working so hard. Especially when they are almost at the end and there are only approximately 17 weeks left to graduation.

Year 12 students were advised at their year assembly last week of the uniform requirements for graduation. All male students will be required to be in long pants. As winter is almost here and the cold is increasing, it is advisable to purchase those pants now and get some good use out of them during the cold weather, instead of purchasing them for a once off use. Female students will be required to wear either their skirt with a pair of black stockings or long pants depending on their preference.

Year 10 are completing their Half-Yearly assessments and they too should be focused on the feedback from their teachers. Any effort to improve is usually rewarded through increased achievement of outcomes.

# DP Report Mr Baczynskyj

Last Monday night saw Michele McGregor stand down as President of the School Council after more than 12 years of dedicated service to Picnic Point High School. Michele has been a solid bond for partnerships between our school, parents and the wider community throughout that period providing hours and hours of selfless contribution. On countless occasions she served as the parent representative on employment panels for staff at our school and therefore has had a direct influence in the formation of the quality staff we enjoy today. Incredibly (for some) Michele has done something very few do in her commitment to our school and that is to continue on as a community representative for several years after her last child left the school. On behalf of the school I would like to acknowledge and thank Michele for all that she has done in helping this school be great.

Years 9 have now completed their NAPLAN tests amidst a lot of publicity about the connection of the results to completion of the HSC - beginning with this cohort. The NAPLAN tests have always been an instrument to provide educators with information relating to the state of a student's literacy and numeracy skills. The connection with HSC completion is related to a student having a 'minimum' standard of literacy and numeracy skills.

The New South Wales Education Standards Authority (NESA) informs, "Introducing a new minimum standard for students to be eligible for the HSC will provide parents, further education and training providers and business and employers with an assurance that students have the everyday literacy and numeracy skills required for life after school."

Some reports have suggested that students who do not achieve a Band 8 will not get an HSC. This is not the case and not achieving Band 8 will not obstruct a student from moving on into Years 10, 11 and 12. In reality, students who do achieve a Band 8 will be considered to have pre-qualified for the minimum standard. All other students will have the opportunity to sit online tests in order to demonstrate that they have reached the standard. To achieve this, the online tests will be available for them up to twice a year in each of Years 10, 11 and 12.

### DP Report Ms Stavros

Year 7 and 8 students are currently receiving notifications for their second assessment task in most subject areas. All parents/carers are encouraged to go through these notifications together with their child and discuss what assistance the child may need to complete the task. It is recommended students complete hand-in tasks a couple of days before they are due so that there is time to proofread and do a final edit. Using the marking criteria to self-assess their work is also useful and good practice. The school runs a Wednesday afternoon tutorial program until 4pm if any Year 7 and 8 students would like extra assistance with their homework and assessment tasks.

Parents are encouraged to stay updated with their child's progress by regularly logging onto the Millennium Schools Parent Portal. This is an extremely valuable tool for any parent as it provides details on a student's attendance/absences, timetable, assessment task details and a record of positive and negative incident entries. Parents will be using the portal to make booking for the upcoming Parent Teacher Nights. Years 8 and 10 is being held on Thursday, 29th June and Years 7 and 9 on Thursday, 20th July. All parents are strongly urged to utilise this opportunity to meet with their child's teachers in order to maximise the link between home and school. 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# Cyber Safety Tips for Parents from Think You Know

#### **Navigating Your Way Through Apps**



How much of what your children get up to online are you actually aware of? Children are naturally curious and intuitive, and are usually at least one step ahead of us parents when it comes to adopting the latest technology. It provides children a fun way to engage with their friends, express their creativity and indulge their natural curiosity which is part of growing up. The sheer volume of apps available can leave parents feeling very much out of the loop. I always recommend that parents learn about the apps their children are using. When you read this, you may think I am recommending you do online research into the potential risks and the settings of very app. However the best thing any parent can do is download the app themselves and have a go. By learning about the app, you will be able to see what potential risks there are. For example, does the app include chat? And if it does, have you discussed with your child the importance of not sharing personal information online?


With so many different apps around, here's some information on a few different types of apps to help you understand them.

# Apps

Instant messaging apps allow users to chat with other users. Parents should always be aware of who their children are communicating with online, and need to be aware of how to adjust privacy settings to ensure unwanted contact cannot occur. Messages on these apps include video, text and images. Cyberbullying is a very real concern for many children when using these types of apps, so parents need to know how they can assist their child if they experience this difficulty. Instant messaging apps include WhatsApp, Messenger, KiK Messenger, Snapchat and Yik Yak. Live streaming apps allow users to share video with others in real time. It is very important that the privacy settings on these apps do not allow contact from strangers, who may share inappropriate content or in the most extreme cases, attempt to groom children. Parents should do everything they can to make sure their children feel safe talking to them or a trusted adult if someone's behaviour makes them uncomfortable, or they come across inappropriate contact. Live streaming apps include Livel.ly, Musical.ly and Facebook Live.

Online gaming is one of the most popular forms of entertainment for children and adults alike. There are many mobile gaming apps as well as traditional console and computer based games that have a chat function that allows players to contact one another, either through direct or group messaging, or voice chat. Many parents aren't aware that gaming apps have these chat functions. Always be aware of how to adjust privacy settings in order to restrict conversations to people your children actually know. Online gaming includes Minecraft, Clash of Titans, Pokémon Go and Animal Jam. Disappearing media is an emerging apps category and is now being included as a function on existing instant messaging apps. These apps 'delete' a sent image or video after a set period of time. Snapchat for example, allows users to send a 'snap' to another user which will then 'disappear' after a period of up to 10 seconds. Instagram and Messenger now include a similar function. Parents and children should be aware that there are ways these images can be saved and distributed further. The simplest method being to take a picture of the image using another device. Once an image or text is online, what happens next is out of our hands, which can have implications for privacy and reputation. Although the photo 'disappears' from the app, they are often stored as part of terms and conditions of the app usage, which means they never technically 'disappear'.

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
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# **TAS Report**



# **ANZAC Service 2017**

Our School conducted its annual ANZAC service on the last day of Term 1.

The service was a solemn commemoration with a special emphasis on the important centenary of 1917.

1917 was an especially difficult year for Australian forces with very significant casualties being sustained across a range of major battles on the Western Front.

This year our key notes address was given by Major Sean McBain of Defense Support for Civilian Operations. Major McBain not only spoke about the role of Australian forces on the Western Front but also about the need for today's youth to remember and honour the sacrifices made for them by previous generations. It was a highly relevant speech that was eloquently delivered.



The service was also supported by personnel from the 5<sup>th</sup> Combat and Support Battalion Holsworthy and elements from Sydney University Regiment Holsworthy. This participation by elements of the Australian Army added both a dignity and a respect that staff students and guests were moved by.

We were honoured to share our service with a young veteran representative from the Soldier ON Organisation, both Federal and State members of Parliament as well as our local government representatives. Local veterans' representatives were also in attendance as well as Police from the Bankstown Area local Command. School principals, captains and prefects from neighbouring high schools gave of their time to share our service with us.



2017's Service clearly honoured our fallen and those who served and are currently serving. The respectful

demeanour of the student body was the ultimate mark of respect for all Australians who served their nation in time of war and continue to do so today.

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# LOTE Faculty

#### Stage 4 Japanese

Our Year 7 students have continued learning about the Japanese language and culture. They have shown considerable enthusiasm as they begin to understand how to count in Japanese. Using this knowledge, they are now also able to say their age and their phone numbers. Year 8 have now completed their first Japanese assessment task, which included pets and adjectives to describe their pets.

#### Stage 5 Japanese

The Year 9 Japanese class have just completed their second assessment task – a very detailed task that tested all four language skills from the Hai! 1, 2 and 3 course. Students also presented a 1 minute speech in Japanese, focusing on intonation, fluency and a variety of grammar and vocabulary. Year 10 have been learning about the weather, clothing and how to use some very complex grammar structures – well done to Year 10 on their ongoing efforts to develop their language skills! The Half Yearly Examination results were of a good standard.

#### Literacy in Japanese

At the start of this term, all Year 7 classes worked to develop their literacy skills in Japanese. Students were introduced to the skills of previewing and predicting and used these skills effectively to complete the required task about the daily routine of a Japanese student. Initially, students were asked to preview the title of the text as well as the jumbled pieces of the magazine article. After this, using their expert predicting skills, they had to piece together the magazine article and place the pieces of the magazine article into chronological order. Once complete, the students read about a typical day for a Japanese high school student called Shun, a real-life boy who lives in Tokyo, Japan. The students thoroughly enjoyed working on these activities with their partner, whilst learning crucial literacy skills. Well done Year 7. Below are a few photos from the lesson.





#### **IO2 Japanese**

The IO2 class have continued to study Japanese with enthusiasm. Towards the end of last term, the class created role-plays in Japanese to introduce themselves



to their friend and focused on images of Japan. We had many discussions about the similarities and differences between Japanese culture. Australian culture and the cultures of the students in the class. The students had the opportunity to even try on kimono and make origami frogs. This term, students have started learning numbers and

will soon learn how to say their ages in Japanese.

# Naidoc Poetry And The Arts Competition



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# **Science Faculty Report**

It has been a great start to Term 2 and across all grades. The students are engaged in learning about the world around us through activities and experiments

**Year 7** – have settled into Term 2 well and have completed the topic of Dangerous Creatures. Their new topic "Water fit for drinking" will explore the physical and chemical properties of water. This unit uses the context of water to introduce various separation techniques and technology which enable humans to provide suitable drinking water. Students will also develop knowledge of water in its 3 forms of matter -solids, liquids and gases. Students will complete numerous experiments and will have opportunities to use their scientific skills to plan and perform experiments using the scientific method.

**Year 8** - are studying the topic Circle of Life and have been learning about the importance of ecosystems and the interaction between various life forms and their environments. Students have completed various literacy strategies including making real world connections and completing an eco-tourism brochure.

**Year 9** – are studying the topic "Fire Science". In class they have been learning about different types of heat transfer and combustion reactions. They have completed many experiments on conduction, convection and radiation. Students have used the scientific method to plan, perform and record various experiments related to fire. In the next few lessons students will start to look at two major forms of energy electricity and chemical.



#### **Radiation experiment 9G**

Year 10 –are currently engaged in discovering concepts related to Biotechnology. Students have explored the structure of the DNA molecule and have made 3D models to consolidate their understandings. Students have also extracted DNA from various fruits and vegetables. The topic goes on to explore various biotechnologies including genetic engineering and cloning.
